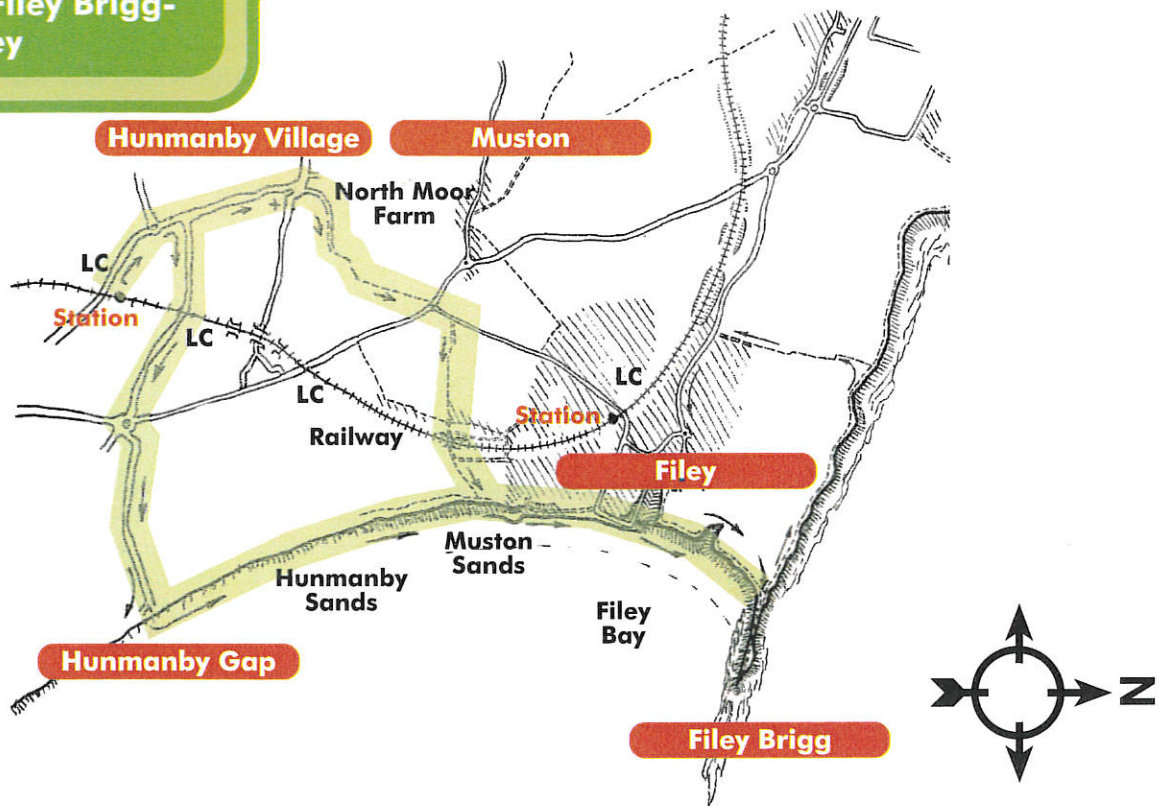


Railway Rambles Series Walk Number 4

Yorkshire Coast Community Rail Partnership

Hunmanby-Filey Brigg- Filey



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This walk combines 3 or 4 miles of quiet lanes and paths, followed by a beach walk and via rocks to Filey Brigg.

Starting Point: Hunmanby Railway Station, (Grid Ref: TA 102767), turn to your right as you leave the station and head towards the village centre.

We will give you two options with this walk, (though there are more), the first walk along the 2.5 mile lane to Hunmanby Gap; the second through the village centre, then farm paths to Muston Sands.

For Hunmanby Gap, take the first road junction to your right, (east), and walk over the railway crossing, passing the many sports fields to your right. After a little over a mile, cross the A165 carefully, then continue along the quiet lane another mile to Hunmanby Gap. Here you will be able to refresh with a cup of tea and the use of toilet facilities. A gentle slope takes you down to the beach and, with the exception of a very high tide, you can wander northwards along the broad sands. It is around 3 miles to Filey seafront, passing the site of the old Butlin's holiday camp, then Primrose Valley and along to Muston Sands.

The alternative route is into the village centre, past the church and straight on, (where the main road swings around to the left). This road steadily becomes a track to North Moor Farm, and then it is field paths to the A165 roundabout. Cross the road with care and, heading towards Filey, take the first junction on your right. This quiet lane takes you past the caravan park and over the railway lines, not far from the sea. With the

golf course to your right, continue to the cliff edge at Muston Sands and walking a little to the north, you can access the seafront safely.

Via the promenade, or beach, make your way along the smart seafront, past the fishing cobbles to Filey Brigg. If using the beach route, take note of tide times, as the sea will meet the rocky cliffs at high tide and cover the mile long Brigg. You can use the cliff top route, but the paths down to the beach are not recommended, and have been the cause of several nasty falls! The Railway Station is half a mile from the seafront and, as you would expect, many refreshments and public facilities are available in the town.

Both walks are around 7 miles (12km), if you include the Brigg, which offers spectacular views across the bay. Each will take you 3 to 4 hours and we would remind you to take particular care with young children when near to the cliffs, and to check on tide times.

The map overleaf is only a general guide and should not be taken as proof of any 'right of way'. For detailed route information see the OS Maps Landranger 107 (at 1-50,000 detail) and explorer 295 (at 1-25,000 scale)
